Weather is often a matter of life and death, especially for the rural and urban poor," she said.

SEASON'S GREETINGS



FLOOD DEATHS DOWN, ECONOMIC LOSSES SIGNIFICANT

An early view of disaster trends in 2012 across Asia, the world's most disaster-prone region, shows that mortality from flood events continues to decline but economic losses remain a major cause of concern. In the year to October, CRED statistics show that 83 disaster events caused 3,103 deaths, affected a total of 64.5 million people and triggered US\$ 15.1 billion damages.

Jerry Velasquez, Head of the UNISDR Asia Pacific, said: "The relative reduction in the number of disasters so far this year in the region is not a cause for complacency. We must still contend with the fact that risk is growing faster than wealth is being created. Exposure is on the rise and flooding represents a serious challenge to Asian cities as we have seen earlier this year in Beijing and Manila where these two cities were partly flooded in a couple of hours." PHILIPPINES EARLY WARNING SAVES

UNISDR has praised the improved performance of early warning systems in the Philippines as Typhoon Bopha cut a swathe of destruction across the country resulting in over 900 deaths and significant economic losses.

UNISDR Head of Regional Office for Asia, Jerry Velasquez, said: "This time last year over 1,400 people died on Mindanao in a similar event but this time big improvements in the early warning systems have saved many lives. INCHEON AND LEADERSHIP

Over 30 officials from Armenia, Cambodia, Gambia, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Mongolia and Republic of Korea met in Korea early November to examine entry points for introducing disaster risk reduction into economic development. The five-day Leadership Development Forum on Mainstreaming Adaptation and Disaster Reduction into Development (MADRiD) was organized by the UN Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNISDR) at the Global Education and Training Institute for Disaster Risk Reduction (GETI) at Incheon, Republic of Korea.

A new report published by the UN Office for Disaster Risk Reduction, UNISDR, lays bare the huge challenges faced by medium-sized African towns struggling to cope with the rising tide of disaster events, rural-urban migration and ecosystem destruction without early warning systems or budgets to reduce risk.

"City Resilience in Africa: A Ten Essentials Pilot" was launched early December at the Africities event attended by thousands of local government representatives from across the continent and takes an in-depth look at Narok and Kisumu in Kenya and Moshi in Tanzania.
