Plenary sessions mark the start and close of the Summit, while a full day is devoted to sharing real experiences during 5 thematic sessions. Each session will be coordinated by two or three regions from the north or south, nrg4sd members or by international organisations. Each session is geared towards highlighting the Region's ability to carry out tangible, innovative and transferable initiatives, through their in-depth knowledge of their territories and their ability to work with local players.

Session 1: Biodiversity - Agriculture - Forest Management

Coordinators: Western Cape (South Africa) - Kaunas (Lithuania)

On land and at sea, scientists forecast a massive decline in biodiversity and far-reaching changes to agriculture across the world among the consequences of climate change. In this change, forests will play a key role through their CO_2 intake and source of renewable raw materials. Which initiatives do regions use to adapt to the new climatic context? How can the last old-growth forests and the people who live there be protected?

Session 2: Water - Integrated management of coastal areas

Coordinators: North Sumatra (Indonesia) - Brittany (France)

Climate change will lead to changes in freshwater resources from rainfall and thawing glaciers, as well as an increase in sea levels, against a backdrop of many extreme climatic events. These effects are coupled with a two-fold change to the global population: increasing urbanisation in sprawling urban complexes requiring economical use of freshwater and a relocation of major population centres and economic activities along coastal areas calling for new urban planning of housing and business. How are regions taking this obstacle concerning the future of their populations and activities into account? Which initiatives are they carrying out to cope with these new conditions?

Session 3: New Technologies - renewable energy

Coordinators: São-Paulo State (Brazil) - Basque Country

The absolute necessity of coming up with more sustainable and environmentally-friendly economic development methods provides an original and promising scope of action for sectors working on technologies which emit less greenhouse gases and reduce their environmental footprint. How are Regions preparing the use of renewable energy at this time of climatic urgency? Which priorities do they have to prepare the impending energy revolution that will turn systems in place since the beginning of the 20th century on their head?

Session 4: Skills sharing and transfer - Networking - Cooperation

Coordinators: Conference of Peripheral Maritime Regions (CPMR) - United Nations Development Programme (UNDP)

In the space of a few years, climate change and its impact on our future has become a matter of global urgency. Regions can only act in partnership, both to voice an aim of solidarity and skills transfer from more developed regions to their less developed counterparts, and to meet specific local conditions. How can skills and technical knowledge be shared between the regions with these

advantages and those who require them? Which type of cooperation schemes can be set up between world regions?

Session 5: Post-Kyoto - After 2012

Coordinators: Tuscany (Italy) in cooperation with the regions of Western Cape (South Africa), Catalonia, Flanders (Belgium)

The Conference held in Bali in December 2007 marked out the entry of a new negotiation phase with, as a target, the renewal of the first generation of agreements born of the Kyoto conference. What are the regions' expectations of the next generation of agreements? What role do they intend to play given their own commitments to combating climate change and their policies thereto? Is there room for a genuinely regional standpoint in negotiations which for the moment have only favoured states/countries?

10.30am Presentation of the project to restore the maritime character of Mont Saint-Michel

The project to restore the maritime character of Mont Saint-Michel was initiated in 1995. It involves the French government and local authorities from Normandy and Brittany working together under an ambitious scheme co-financed by the European Union to restore to its full glory Mont-Saint-Michel's seascape, which is presently impaired by the accumulation of sediment and the presence of man-made facilities. The three core and complementary objectives are to restore a wide area of shoreline to its natural state, to enhance an outstanding heritage site and to completely renew the tourist approach route to the Mont.
