







Training of Trainers Workshop on the Understanding the Sendai Framework at National Level: Development of Risk Reduction Strategies and Plans and Introduction to Monitoring



Summary

The Training of Trainers Workshop on the Understanding the Sendai Framework at National Level: Development of Risk Reduction Strategies and Plans and Introduction to Monitoring aimed to support the capacity development of key focal points and high-level authorities and experts from national government and regional partners responsible for understanding and implementing disaster risk reduction, related SDGs, and climate change policy and programming to:

- strengthen understanding of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction and its monitoring framework in coherence with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Paris Agreement on climate change;
- and in particular, strengthen a cadre of trained trainers to assist countries in the development of national disaster risk reduction strategies and plans by 2020 and related monitoring.

Twenty-five participants from Africa, the Americas, Arab States and Asia represented national government, local government, regional intergovernmental organizations, NGOs, and UNISDR regional office Sendai Framework Monitor programme officers from the Americas and Africa. Participants represented Sendai Framework focal ministries, National Platform/national multi-sectoral and multi-stakeholder coordination forum members and/or trainers from DRR training institutions, and were recommended for participation for their potential to replicate similar capacity development initiatives and/or support roll-out of the Sendai Framework Monitor in their respective countries/regions.

The workshop was hosted and organized 17-20 October 2017 by the UNISDR Global Education and Training Institute (GETI) in Incheon, Republic of Korea, with the support of USAID, the Ministry of Interior and Safety of the Republic of Korea, and Incheon Metropolitan City.

Overall, participants improved their knowledge of disaster risk reduction trends and concepts, the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction innovations, including the role of States and the activities required at national as well as local levels through use of corresponding draft Sendai Framework nationally determined customized indicators for Sendai Framework implementation. Through participation in the training, participants were also introduced to the GETI modules, tools and approach for replicating or adapting the programme to their own capacity development initiatives with other sectoral focal points and relevant stakeholders. The main workshop output is draft Disaster Risk Reduction Action Plans that contribute to the development or alignment of national disaster risk reduction strategies and plans.

Furthermore, participants improved their knowledge of the Sendai Framework Monitor Prototype and its timeline for release, the global targets and indicators for measuring Framework implementation, and corresponding draft technical guidance notes to support understanding and measurement.

About the Sendai Framework

The Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030 was adopted by UN Member States on 18 March 2015 at the Third UN World Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction (WCDRR) in Sendai City, Japan. The Sendai Framework is built on elements which ensure continuity with the work done by States and other stakeholders under its predecessor, the Hyogo Framework for Action, and introduces a number of innovations as called for during the consultations and negotiations. Among the most significant innovations are a strong emphasis on the shift to disaster risk management from disaster management, the definition of seven global targets, the reduction of disaster risk as an expected outcome, a goal focused on preventing new risk, reducing existing risk and strengthening resilience, as well as a set of guiding principles, including primary responsibility of states to prevent and reduce disaster risk and shared responsibility calling for the engagement of all institutions and an all-of-society approach.


Sendai Framework outlines four priorities at global and regional, national and local levels: Priority 1. Understanding disaster risk; Priority 2. Strengthening disaster risk governance to manage disaster risk; Priority 3. Investing in disaster risk reduction for resilience; Priority 4. Enhancing disaster preparedness for effective response and to "Build Back Better" in recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction.

The growth of disaster risk means there is a need to strengthen disaster preparedness for response, take action in anticipation of events, and ensure capacities are in place for effective response and recovery at all levels. The recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction phase is a critical opportunity to build back better, including through integrating disaster risk reduction into development measures.


While the four Sendai Framework priorities define areas where action is needed, it is not an exhaustive list of measures. In practice, it means that the implementation of the four priority areas may require elaboration and planning of additional specific measures at national and local levels, and hence the relevance of the adoption of national and local strategies by 2020 (Sendai Framework target (e)) and plans (paragraph 27(b)) are a first critical step to achieving the other global targets by 2030. This workshop focused on understanding the Sendai Framework and its components, practical tools and methodology towards the development of DRR and/or disaster risk-informed plans and strategies at national and local levels, in addition to understanding the set of 38 indicators identified to measure global progress in the implementation of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction. The indicators were developed by the Open-ended intergovernmental expert working group on indicators and terminology relating to disaster risk reduction (OIEWG), established by the UN General Assembly, which concluded its work in November 2016. The United Nations General Assembly subsequently endorsed the recommendations of the OIEWG contained in its report A/71/644.

Background and Introduction

At the Third UN World Conference for Disaster Risk Reduction (WCDRR) in March 2015, 187 UN member states adopted the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030 – the global blueprint for disaster risk reduction (DRR).

The Sendai Framework was the first major agreement of the post-2015 development agenda, with seven global targets and four priorities for action. It provides the way forward to prevent and reduce disaster risk and offers a solution to saving lives, livelihoods and assets as well as for reducing the fiscal burden on governments to bail-out the aftermath of failed 'development'.

The Sendai Framework's primary focus on stronger risk management is one of the key elements that binds together the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Paris Agreement on climate change. Implementation of the Sendai Framework, addressing a broad scope of both natural and man-made hazards and related environmental, technological and biological hazards, will substantially lower the level of disaster risk and losses, and contribute to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals. Under the leadership of national governments embracing all actors at all levels, and all-of-society engagement, the Sendai Framework is a means to protect the economic, physical, social, cultural and environmental assets of people, communities, businesses and countries.

Learning from the Hyogo Framework for Action 2005-2015 (HFA), the Sendai Framework recognizes the primary role of States and emphasizes the importance of local level actions. The framework specifies in its Priorities for Actions activities at local and national level.

Among its seven global targets (a) – (g), target (e) calls to: Substantially increase the number of countries with national and local disaster risk reduction strategies by 2020. This precise target is shared with indicators of SDG 1 that calls for an end to poverty, SDG 11 on sustainable cities and communities, and SDG 13 on climate action.²

Within the guidance and spirit of the Sendai Framework, the UN member states have requested UNISDR to continue its mandate of facilitating the implementation, review and monitoring of the framework. Accordingly, the UNISDR provides training on understanding and monitoring the Sendai Framework, and implementing disaster risk reduction with affiliated organizations to countries and relevant stakeholders.
