Regional and local governance: Institutional and **Policy Frameworks**

Commitment: Make an investment in protection of resources and assets for national benefit and public good.

- Commit to multiyear, multidisciplinary integration of vulnerability and risk reduction into development planning and policies
 - National strategies and legislation regional/local strategies
 - Institutional capacities technical and mul sectoral local committees
 - Decentralization of responsibilities and resources (local authorities and communities)







Risk Assessment and Early Warning



Fundamental starting point to know, accept what the relative hazards, vulnerabilities and risks are

Basis for coherent territorial and development plans;, setting of priorities

- Dependent upon data needs, information use, shared resources, dialogue
- Need for determining "acceptable" riskspolitical decision.
 - Monitoring of emerging risks (e.g. climate change related, epidemics and HIV/Aids...)
 - Early warning and risk monitoring: High return value on investment, if organized and tied to public information, awareness and preparedness











Reducing underlying risk factors

Sectoral implementation – and linking to sustainable recovery

- Linkages to environmental management and protection endeavors and actors (e.g. wetland & mangrove protection)
- Planning and land use commitment, especially compliance to regulations and codes, building on RISK ASSESSMENTS
- Locally applicable insurance or related financial instruments, variations of micro-finance and micro-credit tied to DRR protection efforts. Addressing the uninsured and poorly insured
- Urban risk management and plans




Reducing underlying risk factors



Matter of governance, and public participation, if to be valid and sustained

- Wider infrastructure protection techniques are known and professional resources available. As much a governance issue as a technical one – enforcement of regulation
- Invest in human capital: improved recovery capacities and safety nets
- Applying existing advanced technologies, can focus on local scales, too (e.g. GIS applications, telecommunications systems, remote sensing)











Context

- Local and Regional Authorities have a key role to play in making DRR a reality at local and sub-national levels.
- Several initiatives are currently underway, still not matching growing demand in this area.
- Local-level implementation of the HFA requires increased efforts, and recognition of both urban and rural dimensions of vulnerability.
- A gap between ongoing DRR processes at the Global and National levels, and the reality on the ground.









Challenges regionally and locally

- Lack of understanding and political incentives: Regional and local Governments have a key role to play to influence and change local risk- and to influence national and global agenda setting
 - Building a "disaster risk reduction movement" needs active participation and involvement of local governments, at all levels
 - ■Limited resources committed at local levels of responsibility to support disaster risk reduction link it to climate change adaptation
 - Competing priorities and agendas, often challenged by competition for funds
 - Lack of accesible tools and technical competence







Opportunities...

- Broad consensus reached on the need to engage local and regional authorities in DRR processes.
- Growing evidence that DRR is a local issue, and that more needs to be done at local and sub-national levels.
- Tools and resources exist to identify and manage disaster risks at the local level.
- Local and Regional authorities an increasingly active actor at the international level.
- Climate Change Adaptation an opportunity for DRR actors to play an important role.





Way forward



- Sound institutional basis for effective governance, at international, national and LOCAL levels- get local and regional Governments more involved
- Include capacity strengthening to address "emerging risks" to natural hazards and related technological disasters in local governments capacity building and governance efforts- focus on climate change adaptation
- Identify gaps in implementation: integrating risk reduction into development programmes and projects – within resources
- ISDR supports partnerships for building resilient cities and communities – forging an ISDR Alliance of Local Governments for Disaster Risk Reduction among local and regional Governments, and promoting an Urban Risk Forum- regional and global







Building an alliance of Local Governments for disaster risk reduction → to implement Hyogo Framework for Action (2005-2015): Building the Resilience of Nations and Communities to Disasters" – a local HFA

Objectives - Local Government driven initiatives & leadership:

- To increase the political space for disaster risk reduction locally, raise awareness among local authorities about the problems and solutions available
- To improve local authorities' understanding of central governments (and vice-versa) with respect to DRR strategies and implementation
- To ensure coordination of DRR actions in this area among different stakeholders
- To facilitate knowledge and information sharing between north/south, urban/rural local authorities to raise awareness

Proposed Objectives of the LGA/DRR

- To facilitate knowledge and information sharing between North/South, urban/rural, local and regional authorities.
- To raise awareness and encourage the active role of local governments in mainstreaming DRR.
- To improve local governments' understanding of central governments (and vice-versa) with respect to DRR strategies and implementation.
- To facilitate coordination of DRR actions in this area among different stakeholders.

Proposed Strategy for Developing the LGA/DRR

- Take stock of existing initiatives and draft a Concept Note for the LGA/DRR (Nov - Dec 2007)
- Hold a Consultative Meeting with Local and Regional Authorities in Barcelona (May 2008)
- Establish an "Advisory Group" for the LGA/DRR (May Jul 2008)
- Hold a broader meeting to discuss proposed objectives, governance mechanism, etc. (Global Dialogue - Chengdu, China, 12-14 Nov 2008)
- Global Urban Risk Meeting in Incheon, Korea (2009)
- Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction Geneva, Switzerland, 15-19 Jun 2009









Consultative Meeting: 9-11 April 2008, Barcelona

- A reality-check, to better understand the demand and needs from local and regional authorities.
- Substantive comments and observations on the LGA/DRR concept were put forward.
- Initial commitment and support to the Alliance was reached.
- Draft Terms of Reference (ToR) for the Alliance and its «Advisory Group» are currently being finalised.
- Next steps and follow-up actions up to the 2nd session of the GP/DRR have been agreed upon.







The Way Forward...

- 2nd Consultative Meeting of the LGA/DRR will be held in Chengdu, China, on 12-14 Nov. 2008.
- Participants will review and finalise draft ToRs for the Alliance and LGA/DRR «Advisory Group».
- Further discussion on the proposed activities, governance mechanisms and overall strategy for developing the Alliance will be held.
- Key events for the LGA/DRR currently include the following:
 - (i) 2nd GP/DRR, Geneva, 15-19 Jun 2009.
 - (ii) Incheon, Korea, 24-26 Aug 2009 Official Launch of the LGA/DRR?
