Background and	Governance influences the way in which governments, public servants, the media,
Rationale	the private sector and civil society organizations are willing and able to account for disaster losses, assess risks systematically and coordinate their actions to manage and reduce disaster-related risks. Sufficient public awareness to recognize and address risk, coupled with the political will to set policy, allocate appropriate resources and translate policies into local action is crucial. Equally critical is the need for institutions with sufficient managerial and coordination capacity to manage and integrate the efforts of relevant sectors. In practice risk governance arrangements are still often inappropriate and disaster management institutions lack the political authority or technical capacities to influence important decisions. Despite the progress made under the HFA in many places the question remains how to move from ad hoc response to systematic and comprehensive disaster risk management? During the last 4 years China and Germany have been working closely together to support the application of a more coherent, effective and efficient risk and disaster management system.
	Experiences gained within this cooperation and Germany's profound experience in disaster risk management lead to few lessons that are relevant to other countries and regions – ranging from underestimated role the private sector can play, to the benefit of sharing country specific experiences in order to develop a more comprehensive disaster risk management system that effectively connects the local with the national level. In order to foster this process, the German government has decided to assist countries to access tailor-made approaches, methods, services and products on comprehensive disaster risk management in response to their country specific interests and needs. The support promotes a match-making of capacity development services, of successful and replicable approaches and of state-of-the-art advice and equipment to strengthen the countries' resilience to disasters.
