Pre-disaster recovery planning enables effective coordination of recovery activities and expedites a unified recovery effort

Post-disaster recovery planning forms the foundation for allocating resources and provides the benchmark for progress



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- Sandy made landfall in New Jersey on October 29, 2012
- Second-largest Atlantic storm on record, affecting the East Coast from Florida to Maine
- Produced record storm tides and surges in coastal areas of New York and New Jersey
- Impacted most densely populated region in the nation
- **8.5 million** customers lost power
- 23,000 shelter occupants
