



A breakdown of different responses shows the 'fading-out' of perceptions of progress from national level to communities 'at-risk'






2. The foundation for building resilience is people's awareness and understanding of the risks that they face.

Four things people at the frontline are saying...

- Nationally-formulated policies are not generating widespread systemic changes in local practices.
- 2. Resources are scarce and considered one of the main constraints to progress... but there are resources at local level, which remain untapped.
